

Dog Moms & Dads reminder

For those who walk dogs to handle bathroom needs, please be diligent in picking up any deposits at the time it occurs. If you find this occurs and you don't have a disposal bag, mark the location with a stick or something to be able to come back later that same day with a bag. It is good to carry pet waste bags 100% of the time in your pocket - the Dollar Tree store nearby has a package of 60 pet bags for just \$1.25 or ask a neighbor to recycle grocery plastic bags for supplies. Carry a flashlight if you are walking your dog in the early morning or late evening, where it is harder to keep up with



this maintenance. A flashlight is also good for safety so cars can see you and you can avoid tripping or falling on ice.

Invisible Leaks by Edye Buchanan



Most property owners know appliances will only last 15-20 years. Around that time, some of the materials used to build those appliances start to break down and fail. We know the same is true for a lot of building materials such as roofs, concrete and plumbing materials.

Have you ever wondered about the water supply in your unit? There is a master shutoff for the building, plus a main shutoff valve for the water in each of our units. Downstream of

that shutoff, plumbing T's send water to your kitchen, bathrooms and your outside faucet. Over time the plastic fittings become brittle and crack.

One morning, this unit owner discovered wet carpeting in a bedroom closet on the other side of the wall from this piping. The drywall was not wet because the leak was so small, water dripped to the floor rather than spraying the walls. The repair required the drywall to be cut away and plumbing components resealed. The homeowner had to replace the carpet and pad in the closet, because the leak occurred over a period of time and mildew was starting to occur.

Unfortunately, this is not an isolated incident as other unit owners have shared a similar story. And if you recall, the water usage within our community has increased. If you notice unexplained moisture near a wall where piping may be found, be sure to contact a plumber as you may have an invisible pipe leak.

We do not want residents shutting off the water to a building using the building shut off inside a unit. As a matter of fact, we have signage in each unit specifying not to touch the turn off valve for the building. Water to the building must be turned off outside at the curbstop.

Seniors Living Alone option for Emergency Help

There are many individuals in our community that live alone and may find themselves in the position of needing to let fire department/medic personnel come into your home if you call 911 with a fall or health emergency. Even if you live with a spouse, family member or friend, you may still find an

occasion where you need to let the fire department in your home to provide care (911 emergency help) before another person can arrive at your condo location. Some people <u>hide a house key</u> outside, and this is not always the safest option. Second, seniors or single residents may rely on being able to give <u>the Garage Door Opener Code</u> to the 911 operator. If this isn't an option or is not working, the next best option is for a front door key to be available for emergency personnel. An

inexpensive option to have a realtor lockbox type unit, where there is a 4-digit code on it. The actual front door key is placed in this lockbox. This box is very easy to open, and you would give the lockbox code to family or the 911 operator, then fire personnel could get to you quickly. This would avoid the possibility that a window in your condo would need to be broken in order for the emergency services to enter.

In your Google search browser, or on Amazon app or Amazon.com, enter "realtor lock box" and hit enter. You should then see many options to choose from. The one that was the least expensive that I recently purchased has the 4 number dials displayed on the front. They also sell a nicer version where the number dials are covered up to protect them from weather. You install this lockbox close by your front door, or an alternate location is by your garage door keypad.
