They said hanging baskets in your garden would improve the look. I'm not convinced.






Did You Know?? – Water Heaters and Avoiding/Dealing with a Tank leak By Kathy Strohm and Rick Calhoun

Did you know that experts and a long history record on hot water heaters shows that these critical appliances in our homes have a lifespan of around 10-12 years (new tanks have as little as a 6-year warranty with better models offering 9 or 12-year warranties?) These hot water tanks may leak and cause inside flooding in your condominium unit without warning.

If you see any dampness around the bottom of your hot water heater indicating a small leak, <u>it's time to proactively get a professional to replace this</u>. Each hot water heater must be installed by a <u>licensed professional plumber</u> and <u>must be</u> <u>inspected by the City of Columbus</u> and a sticker on whether the installation passed inspection is then attached to the water heater. This tag should help you determine the age of your current hot water heater.

For reference only: Hot water heaters costs are \$579-\$699 for a new Natural Gas, 40,000 BTU (how fast the water heats up), 40 Gallon tank size including a 9-year or 12-year warranty. Installation cost is in addition to this. You can purchase your own unit and have a professional install it or you can buy the hot water heater from the plumbing professional who will install it. Plus \$10 for the hose, \$20 for the drip pan.





A further protection against a hot water heater leaking unexpectedly and causing any flooding, our units have a drain hole (see picture above) in the concrete slab which has other pipes draining to this. Every hot water heater also has a hose attachment connection near the bottom.

If your hot water tank is leaking slowly and you cannot get a profession in to replace it, a precaution is to attach a short hose and run it to the drain hole. About \$10 cost.

If the tank is leaking significantly, you can shut off the water line leading to the hot water heater, attach a hose to the hot water heater hose connection, and drain your entire hot water heater using the hose placed into the drain hole in the floor. Leave your hot water heater water line OFF until the professional replacement is completed.

Drip pans are required by city code when new water heaters are installed in places where a leak could cause damage. These pans are not meant to protect from a catastrophic tank failure; they're meant to catch the slow leak that no one notices. \$20 cost.

WARNING – WARNING - WARNING

If your plumbing professional indicates that they need to shut the water off to the entire building, not just the inside shut off to your hot water heater, there are other critical facts unit owners must be aware of.

- 1. You must contact each of the other unit owners in your building to let them know the water needs to be shut off and how long the shut off is going to last.
- 2. Locate the outside master water shut off for your building. These are marked on the top of the cap with WATER and are painted BLUE, and the location is marked at the Curb with a BLUE stripe. (See example pictures) The cap may be standing up out of the ground a few inches or it may be flush to the ground. If the owner/plumber is having difficulty locating the blue shutoff cap, call Rick Calhoun or a Board member and we will respond.

Master water cap flush to ground








e.g., A 5' length with male/female ends



Your professional plumber should already have the correct tool to shut off the master valve outside the building leading to the street drain. Call Rick Calhoun if necessary as we keep a backup tool that is only to be used by those trained to use this shut off tool. Unit owners should never attempt to access this master shut off with any tools of their own.

Remember: When the master shut off outside is turned off, this not only turns off water to your unit, but it also turns off the water to the other 3 units in the same building you are a part of.



Our Board and Rick try to do an inspection on outside water shut offs once every year or two. We remove the cap, inspect the collar, insert the key and check for the valve nut and then turn it on to make sure the valve works.

Your professional plumber should already have the correct tool to shut off the master shut off valve outside the building leading to the street drain. Call Rick Calhoun if necessary as we keep a backup tool that is only to be used by those trained to use this shut off tool. Unit owners should not attempt to access this master shut off with any tools of their own.
