

Reminder on Monthly Condo Dues – Late Fee Penalty for Delinquent Balances

Our Vaughn Group Limited representative, Luana Cossin, was at the Community Meeting on June 25. She shared that we have several past due balances for resident accounts where they are not making the correct 2025 dues payment amount, instead are still making only the 2024 payment amount. For example, if it was \$389 in 2024, this is now \$399 in 2025 monthly dues. Likewise, if your 2024 amount was \$351.00 this increased to \$361.00 per month.

This leaves a \$10 past due balance for each month. When this past due amount goes beyond the grace period for the payment, a \$25 penalty is applied on the account balance. So now, the resident has the \$10 balance + \$25 late fee, for a \$35 balance due. A past due letter will be sent via US Mail for these past due accounts.

Contact Luana at 614-408-3219 and she can help you process a one-time catch-up payment and help you set up your monthly bank deduction or other form of autopayment, so the late fees won't continue to compound the problem.

Landscape Variance Reminder Letter

Our Board had a letter distributed via email to all residents reminding them they cannot 1) Remove existing shrubs or trees, 2) Cannot plant other permanent landscape items (shrubs, trees) without getting an approval from the Board via a Landscape Variance. Refer to your letter on this sent out June 22, 2025. Annual flowers planted in shared landscape areas (e.g. flowers at the mail stations) or in flower beds around your unit are fine. If you plant annuals, please remove them at the end of the growing season, e.g. after the frost has killed/damaged them. 



Features: Produce, baked goods, crafts, music and activities

New Albany Farmers Market Thursdays through August 28 | 4-7 p.m.

Features: Shop local produce like coffee and artisan products + enjoy food trucks. Free concerts at the Hinson Amphitheater on select dates.

Parking: Park along 200 Market St.

Space: Outdoors at New Albany's Market Square.

Westerville Saturday Farmers Market Sa

Saturdays through September 27 | 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

- Features: Shop goods like produce, artisan baked goods, and prepared food on-site.
- Parking: Park in the lots behind Westerville City Hall, 21 S. State St.

A Few Words About Dogs

From the Board

As a reminder, pets are to be leashed outdoors. The leash should be no longer than 6 feet when in the vicinity of other animals or people unless the dog is friendly to the person or dog in its vicinity. It is the responsibility of dog owners to clean up messes as soon as possible. Dogs should not roam into the Limited Common Element of other residents/units.

The Limited Common Element is defined as: those portions of the Common Element (patio, exterior perimeter of the veranda to the bushes and driveway areas, and mulched area bordering sidewalk) that serve one unit and whose use, benefit, and enjoyment is reserved for the lawful occupants of that unit. This is the area immediately outside each unit, including the sidewalk, the fence patio with cement pad, the mulched area between the sidewalk and the veranda in the Abbey and Canterbury style models, and the exterior parking area immediately in front of the garage.

Condo Library – Expanded Selection of Large Print books

Lynne Talbott has been working to incorporate about 10 new Large Print books that were donated by a resident when she found them at a local store as donations from various public libraries from around central Ohio. They are in excellent condition and have various topics and authors. Large print books are primarily needed to make reading accessible to individuals with vision impairments or other reading-related challenges. They offer larger font size and increase spacing, which can reduce eye strain and improve comprehension for those who find standard print difficult to read. Beyond visual impairments, large print books can also benefit language learners, children, and anyone experiencing eye fatigue or seeking a more comfortable reading experience.

Try using our library – no checkout needed, just return books back to the basket so Lynn can check them back in and make sure they get shelved in the proper place.

Contact Lynne Talbott if you have donations of Large Print books but she is NOT accepting other paperbacks or hard copy books as we have limited shelf space.
