- **Flexible location:** Fairy gardens can be created indoors for controlled environments or outdoors in various settings, from large pots to a corner of a flower bed.



Critical Warning about Carbon Monoxide

Kathy Strohm at 4617 Collingville Ave. had a life-threatening experience where she could have died in her sleep overnight on July 25 due to gas leaking on her hot water heater. Carbon Monoxide (CO2) has NO smell, the lead had NO sound like hissing, and it is colorless, NO fumes could be seen to give a warning if you don't have a CO2 detector. Please buy a carbon monoxide detector at your nearest store and locate it near where you have a risk of a natural gas leak from a furnace, hot water heater or gas stove.

My story: I had been home all day and sat down at my kitchen table at about 5:00 pm eating dinner when a loud alarm suddenly went off. I quickly eliminated the ceiling mounted smoke detectors and there was no smoke anywhere inside.

I then looked in my kitchen at the carbon monoxide detector that sits on the kitchen counter just around the corner from the gas hot water heater closet. It was blaring a loud warning, and the front showed 48 ppm of carbon monoxide (very high level). Hit the Test/Reset button to see if that would stop the alarm sound. It didn't. Next, I got my dog on her leash and went outside and called 911 to request Fire Department confirmation. 911 connected me with a Fire Department lieutenant who asked me what the alarm indicated, and I said 48 ppm. He then asked me to open the back of the alarm, remove the batteries and tell him what the **manufactured date** was. Mine was May 2024, so the device was good.

He told me to <u>immediately leave my house and get outside in fresh air.</u> A fire truck arrived in 5 minutes.

The firemen took just 3-4 steps inside my condo with their professional carbon monoxide detector, and it immediately started sounded a loud warning. As they walked inside toward my kitchen, it got louder and louder. Their device showed there was a life-threatening level of carbon monoxide in my condo!! The Lieutenant asked if I had a headache or if I felt nauseated, both symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning. I did have a slight headache, but I ignored it.

I told him my cat had scrambled under a bed, and I couldn't catch her. He said I had done the right thing getting out with the dog and not staying inside trying to catch my cat. The firemen went through every room, opening windows and turning ceiling fans on High to bring fresh air in.


First, they checked my gas furnace (in the attic over the garage), and it was fine. Next, they opened the closet door to the kitchen pantry and hot water heater. Their detector showed this was the source of the carbon monoxide and they turned the lever on that gas shut off immediately.

They kept me outside for 30 minutes while they monitored inside for CO2 with their equipment. The

lieutenant came outside and explained that the inspection date sticker on my hot water heater from City of Columbus (when mine was installed) showed it was from 2012 - 13 years ago. This needed replacement but since I had no problem getting hot water for my shower and kitchen sink and no water was leaking, nothing alerted me the hot water heater was failing.

I'm safe, my dog and cat are safe, and none of us have any residual health issues, so I'm very lucky.

If I had gone to bed that night, the Fire Lieutenant said I would not have woke up the next morning - I would have died. I bought 2 new carbon



If you live in multifamily housing like condos or apartments that share walls and attic space with other units, <u>pay attention</u>. Your unit may have current/newer gas appliances, but an adjoining neighbor might not. Gas fumes can travel through walls and shared spaces like attics.

Our community was built in 2001, so check your hot water heater for a sticker to see how old it is. If you are getting your furnace serviced each year before winter, the HVAC technician would advise you if there was any concern on the gas connection to the furnace.

Your plumber will handle the city permit and inspection of your new unit. Digital photos are submitted to approve your newly installed hot water heater, so you don't have to be home for an appointment like you did in the past. Thats a plus!

Another disturbing finding (see photo) was I found there was NO drip pan under the hot water heater. If it had suddenly failed and leaked, 40 gallons of water would have flooded the areas within 5-10 feet which includes my washer, dryer, refrigerator, stove, and food pantry!! Yikes, so glad that didn't happen. A drip pan at Home Depot is about \$20, which is a small preventative price to pay."
